AMCHP Turns to 2012 Funding Advocacy – Launches Initiatives to Raise Title V Awareness

As we've reported, final federal agency spending plans implementing cuts made in the final FY 2011 continuing resolution are due to be finalized this Friday, May 13. We should be able to soon after confirm the final FY 2011 Title V allocation – which is expected to be flat minus a small across the board cut. We should also soon learn details on how CDC is allocating \$740 million in unspecified cuts this year.

As that work is finalized, AMCHP has already begun turning to our FY 2012 advocacy on behalf to the Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant and other key MCH programs. On April 15 we submitted written testimony to the U.S. House of Representatives Appropriations Committee articulating our request and justification for \$700 million for Title V in FY 2012. A copy of that testimony is here – and a one-page fact sheet outlining our 2012 request is here.

Leadership of the House of Representative's Appropriations Committee also just put out a call for Members of Congress to submit their programmatic funding priorities to committee chairs by May 20. This means there is a small window of opportunity for MCH advocates to urge your elected officials to include Title V among their priorities. Accordingly, on May 5, AMCHP issued a *Legislative Alert* to all members and friends listing five options for reaching members of Congress and urging advocates to take five for Title V. Support for Title V Featured in Three Major Newspapers – Members Asked to Share Link, Comment, Blog, Tweet and find Other Ways to Spread the Word



In concert with our recent push to raise awareness and support for Title V, we are pleased to report that an oped by AMCHP CEO Mike Fraser was picked up by three major newspapers. The op-ed raises awareness about how the program works and seeks to tie support for Title V with Mother's Day. Last Thursday, New York's Newsday newspaper ran the op-ed under the headline "A Wise Investment for Moms, Babies." Newsday has the 12th largest circulation of all U.S. newspapers so this is terrific exposure and a major win in support of AMCHP's Strategic Plan Goal 1 – "AMCHP will be an effective voice to strategically communicate the critical importance of maternal and child health issues." Unfortunately on-line access to the full piece in Newsday is by subscription only but a copy posted with permission is available here.

On Sunday, *The Des Moines Register* picked up the op-ed under the headline "Honor Our Mothers by Backing Title V." While smaller in circulation, this paper serves Senate Appropriations Labor-HHS Committee Chairman Tom Harkin's home state which is key exposure and provided a high profile opportunity to highlight his leadership in protecting funding to date. Finally, an op-ed ran in *The Lexington Herald-Leader* under the headline "Support for Title V Honors our Mothers." This is the home state paper for House Appropriations Committee Chairman Harold Rogers who was the lead drafter of the House bill that initially proposed to cut \$210 million from Title V.

MomsRising also posted a version of the op-ed to the blog section of their website under the headline "Among the Most Efficient Programs: Maternal and Child Health."

AMCHP and the text4baby State Enrollment Contest Webinar

AMCHP will be participating in the text4baby State

pregnant women and new mothers in the text4baby
program. The goal of the text4baby State Enrollment
Contest is to reach twice as many users through a healthy
competition among states. The top three states that have
enrolled the most users in text4baby between May 10
and October 20 will be announced at the American Public
Health Association Annual Meeting in Washington, DC.
The prize for each of the winning states will be a sponsored
luncheon/press event for text4baby partners in that state.

In honor of Women's Health Week and the kick-off of text4baby's State Enrollment Contest, text4baby will host a special webinar for AMCHP members on May 11 from 3 to 4 p.m. EST. The webinar will feature an update on what text4baby has accomplished this past year, best practices from state Title V programs, and a special new text4baby competition. To register, visit here.

Text4baby, the country's first free, health education program in the form of text messages, provides timely tips and expert advice sent directly to the cell phones of pregnant women and new moms. Pregnant women and new mothers who text "BABY" (or "BEBE" for Spanish) to 511411 receive weekly text messages, timed to their due date or their baby's birth date through the baby's first year. The messages, which have been developed by

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government and nonprofit health experts like the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, American Academy of Pediatrics, and March of Dimes, deal with nutrition, immunization and birth defect prevention, among other topics. RFA for the Partnership to Eliminate Disparities in Infant Mortality Action Learning Collaborative

In 2008, CityMatCH, AMCHP and the National Healthy Start Association (NHSA), with funding from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation created the Partnership to Eliminate Disparities in Infant Mortality. This project seeks to eliminate racial inequities contributing to infant mortality within U.S. urban areas, and is in its second round of funding. A major component of this work is a multi-city Action Learning Collaborative (ALC). The ALC approach is one in which state, local and community collaborative teams are selected, and then provided with training and technical assistance in current research, best practices and systems building. Through the course of the ALC, teams will have the opportunity to network across state lines, strategize to break down barriers in addressing inequities in infant mortality, and design new and innovative solutions tailored to their individual communities. The emphasis of this team-based ALC is on innovative approaches to reducing racial inequities in infant mortality in urban communities, with particular attention paid to the impacts of racism. The Lancet Launches New Stillbirths Series

The Lancet Series, "Stillbirths," highlights the rates and causes of stillbirth globally, explores interventions to prevent stillbirths (as well as maternal and neonatal deaths), and sets key actions to halve stillbirth rates by 2020. In the series, launched on April 14, 2011, stillbirth refers to all pregnancy losses after 22 weeks of gestation. but, for numerical comparisons between international data, the World Health Organization definition of a stillbirth as having a birthweight of at least 1,000 g or a gestational age of at least 28 weeks (third-trimester stillbirth) is used. Contents include six papers, two research articles, and comments from professional organizations and parent groups. They provide analysis of the problem and the results of incorporating stillbirths into existing health systems for women and infants, with examples of successes and missed opportunities, especially for families with very low incomes. Once on the streets, these young people often lose touch with the caring adults in their extended families, schools and communities that can help and protect them. As a result, they frequently fall victim to exploitation and abuse. They disproportionately suffer from serious health, behavioral and emotional problems. And they are often unable to find or keep the safe, stable housing that is so crucial to a successful transition to adulthood. Since 1996, projects funded by the Street Outreach Program have provided services to youth living on the streets and in unstable situations by reaching out to them. These projects aim to increase young people's safety, well-being, and selfsufficiency, and to help them build permanent connections with caring adults, with the goal of getting them off the streets. ACF Funding for Basic Center Program

Deadline: June 24

In the early 1970s, an alarming number of youth were leaving home without parental permission, crossing state lines, and falling victim to exploitation and other dangers of street life. In response to the widespread concern about the problem of runaway and homeless youth, Congress authorized the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act of 1974 (RHYA), which provided financial support for states through a competitive grant program. The implementation and administration of the program was placed in the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB) within the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Today, FYSB continues to administer the Basic Center Program (BCP) funding to the

organizations and shelters that serve and protect runaway, homeless, and street youth. BCP funds are allotted annually based on each state's relative population of youth less than 18 years of age, subject to certain adjustments as described in 42 U.S.C. section 5711 (b). To learn more, visit here.

ACF Funding for Infant Adoption Awareness Training Grants

Deadline: June 27

These grants will be available to national, regional, or local adoption organizations for the purpose of training the staff of eligible health centers in providing adoption information and referrals to pregnant women on an equal basis with all other courses of action included in nondirective counseling to pregnant women. The focus of these projects is to increase and maximize the penetration of training delivered to the target population: public and nonprofit private entities that provide health services to pregnant women, including voluntary family planning projects; community health centers, migrant health centers, and centers serving homeless individuals and residents of public housing; and school health clinics. RWJF Grant for Childhood Obesity Prevention

Deadline: July 1

Administration for Children and Families Grants to Tribes, Tribal Organizations and Migrant Programs for Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention Programs

Deadline: July 5

The primary purpose of this funding opportunity announcement is to provide financial support to selected Tribes, Tribal Organizations, and Migrant Programs for

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child abuse prevention programs and activities that are consistent with the goals outlined by Title II of Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act. This legislation specifies that one percent of the available funding from Title II will be reserved to fund Tribes, Tribal Organizations and Migrant Programs. The goal of the programs and activities supported by these funds is to prevent the occurrence or recurrence of abuse or neglect within the Tribal and Migrant populations. The funds must support more effective and comprehensive child abuse prevention activities and family support services, including an emphasis on strengthening family life and reaching out to include fathers, that will enhance the lives and ensure the safety and well-being of Migrant and Native American children and their families.
