MANAGEMENT MINUTE



"The best way to predict the future is to create it." — Alan Kay

We are now in the final phases of our nearly year-long strategic planning effort to create the AMCHP 2015-2018 Strategic Plan. With your help, over the last 10 months, we have listened to your inputs, held facilitated conversations, and collected information virtually.



In late June, your extensive feedback culminated in the AMCHP Board of Directors finalizing a draft of the plan through a two-day process. The board focused its discussions on the following areas:

- Identification of the conditions that will affect AMCHP in the next one to five years
- Definition of assumptions about AMCHP's future environment and critical uncertainties inherent in that future
- Implications of the above to AMCHP's future direction
- Assessment of AMCHP's value as compared to competitors
- Review of AMCHP's Core Ideology as compared to others
- AMCHP's unique "envisioned future" – identifying what the organization seeks to become as compared to others
- Longer-term stretch goal (internal vision of what would constitute success for AMCHP)
- Vivid description (external vision of what AMCHP seeks to accomplish for its stakeholders)
- Finalize and prioritize critical goals (specific

outcomes AMCHP seeks to achieve)

- Finalize draft strategic objectives
- Prioritize draft objectives and strategies

In this column of Management Minute, we'll share the finished work on envisioned future and core ideology for AMCHP. The envisioned future includes AMCHP's 10+ year vision for the organization, providing a unifying focal point that represents a huge challenge with a clear finish line. The vision requires significant time to complete. Note that the new vision includes the qualifying terms, 'values and invests' to enhance its meaning and impact.

Vision

AMCHP envisions a nation that values and invests in the health and well-being of **all** women, children, families, and communities.

The core ideology clarifies what doesn't change for an organization in an environment of rapid and unpredictable change. The core ideology consists of the AMCHP's core purpose (mission) and core values. The AMCHP mission is a concise statement of the organization's reason for being. It recognizes the uniqueness of AMCHP. Below is the newly revised mission for AMCHP. Note that the new mission represents a rather significant change from the prior mission in that it focuses on the broader impact of MCH programs to the overall health of women, children, and families.

Mission

The mission of the Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs is to protect and promote the optimal health of women, children, and families.

MANAGEMENT MINUTE CONT.

Core values are essential and enduring tenets of the organization – a small set of timeless guiding principles or characteristics. Core values require no external justification – they have intrinsic value and importance to those inside the organization. These values are so fundamental and deeply held that they will seldom change if at all. The primary changes in core values proposed included the concept of collaboration replacing partnership and empowerment, the redefinition of diversity to inclusion, and the addition of excellence to represent a focus on continued quality improvement.

Health Reform Implementation

ACA Funding for Community Health Centers

Last week, during National Health Center Week, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Burwell announced \$169 million in Affordable Care Act (ACA) funding to 266 new health center locations in 46 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico to deliver primary health care to communities in need. These new health center sites are projected to increase access to health care services for over 1.2 million patients. Healthier Pregnancy Provider Training

A new initiative, *Healthier Pregnancy: Tools and Techniques to Best Provide Affordable Care Act Covered Preventive Services* was developed through partnership of several federal agencies. The initiative addresses successful practices in implementing U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommendations around obesity, alcohol, depression, intimate partner violence, tobacco, and breastfeeding in pre- and perinatal care settings. The purpose of this initiative is to catalyze change among providers and organizations to operationalize the USPSTF recommendations as articulated in the Affordable Care Act, by increasing screening and referral for the following six preventive services in pre- and perinatal care settings and to increase understanding and implementation of trauma-informed care. Coffee Talk 4: Managing Change

Presenter: Brenda Jones, DHSc, RN, MSN, WHNP-BC, Deputy Director, Office of Women's Health, Illinois Department of Public Health

Managing change is not an easy task-especially some of the "moving the needle" efforts currently gearing up in the Title V programs! Successful collective impact efforts require a few key conditions-among them a united plan among the many individuals and organizations that impact the issue as well as collaboration among the key players. While the effects of collective impact are often outside the control of a single individual or organization, achieving change within those systems is dependent on great leadership at both the individual and organizational levels. This presentation will share a brief overview of the leadership skills and capacities needed to lead collective impact initiatives, followed by Brenda's personal experience in creating collective action among key players during a major statewide MCH reorganization.

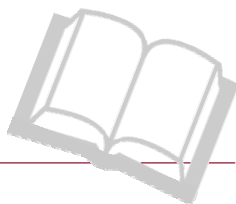

Project Leadership: Effecting Change, One Parent at a Time

Children with special health care needs and their families rely on a complex web of services, systems and programs, yet their voices often go unheard when policies are being developed. With funding from the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health, Family Voices of California has developed Project Leadership, a training curriculum aimed at increasing the capacity of families to engage in public policy advocacy. The curriculum is designed to accommodate the demanding schedules of families, and also provides ongoing mentoring and support. In the program's first two years, 79 family members around the state completed the training and began participating in committees and planning bodies; testifying at state and local hearings; and telling their stories through the media. Reducing Health Disparities among Minority and Underserved Children

Specific targeted areas of research include biobehavioral studies that incorporate multiple factors that influence child health disparities such as biological (e.g., genetics, cellular, organ systems), lifestyle factors, environmental (e.g., physical and family environments) social (e.g., peers), economic, institutional, and cultural and family influences; studies that target the specific health promotion needs of children with a known health condition and/or disability; and studies that test and evaluate the comparative effectiveness of health promotion interventions conducted in traditional and nontraditional settings. 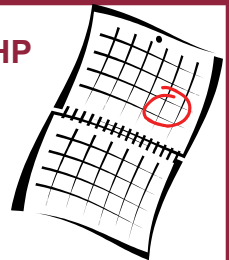
