AMCHP and Partners to Host National Environmental Public Health Tracking Network Webinar

AMCHP, the American Public Health Association (APHA) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will host an informational webinar on the [National Environmental Public Health Tracking Network](#) (Tracking Network). The Tracking Network is a system of integrated health, exposure, and hazard information and data from a variety of national, state, and city sources which synthesizes and standardizes data that would be usually be kept by many different agencies, allowing professionals to see how health and the environment are related. It is a one-of-a-kind website that brings together information that cannot be found, or is hard to find, anywhere else. The Tracking Network offers MCH professionals data on developmental disabilities, reproductive and birth outcomes, asthma, childhood lead poisoning, birth defects, community design and more. CDC Vital Signs April Issue Focuses on Preventing Repeat Teen Pregnancies

Nearly one in five births to teens, ages 15-19, are repeat births. Having more than one child as a teen can limit the teen mother's ability to finish her education or get a job. Infants born from a repeat teen birth are often born too small or too soon, which can lead to more health problems for the baby. The April issue of CDC *Vital Signs* will focus on resources for health care providers, public health practitioners and communities to counsel teens, promote effective types of birth control, and connect teen mothers with support services including home visiting programs. RWJF Understanding the Use and Impact of Price Data in Health Care

Deadline: Apr. 17

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) is accepting proposals to fund empirical studies with strong research designs that would contribute to the knowledge base of the use and impact of health care price data, with the goal of providing reliable and generalizable evidence to inform policymakers and delivery system participants and to help accelerate progress toward using price information effectively. Research could focus on measuring how widely price information is used in health care, assessing awareness of price transparency on the part of consumers and providers, exploring the impact of price data on behavior by delivery system participants, and analyzing public policy related to the use of price information in health care. CDC NCCDPHP Cooperative Agreement Announcement

Deadline: Apr. 19, Letter of Intent due Mar. 19

CDC and the National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion (NCCDPHP) announces the availability of FY 2013 funds to implement State Public Health Actions to Prevent and Control Diabetes, Heart Disease, Obesity and Associated Risk Factors and Promote School Health. There are two

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components to this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA). The first is a non-competitive basic component that will be awarded to all 50 states and the District of Columbia if they submit a technically acceptable application. Approximately \$28 million per year is available for the basic component. The second is a competitive enhanced component that will provide funding for up to 25 states. All states and the District of Columbia are eligible to apply for the competitive enhanced component. The enhanced component will be objectively reviewed and scored. Approximately \$42 million per year is available to fund up to 25 states for the enhanced component. The project period for both components is 5 years, with a 12-month budget period and an anticipated award date of Jul. 1. For more information, [click here](#).

CDC State Public Health Actions to Prevent and Control Diabetes, Heart Disease, Obesity and Associated Risk Factors and Promote School Health Grant

Deadline: Apr. 19, Letter of Intent due Mar. 19

This State Public Health Actions to Prevent and Control Diabetes, Heart Disease, Obesity and Associated Risk Factors and Promote School Health announcement outlines an approach to preventing and reducing the risk factors associated with childhood and adult obesity, diabetes, heart disease, and stroke; it also addresses management of these chronic diseases. The activities and strategies outlined in this announcement are organized by the four chronic disease prevention and health promotion domains: 1) Epidemiology and surveillance; 2) Environmental approaches that promote health and support and reinforce healthful behaviors; 3) Health system interventions to improve the effective delivery and use of clinical and other preventive services; and 4) Community-clinical linkages to support cardiovascular disease and diabetes prevention and control efforts and the management of chronic diseases. The purpose of this funding opportunity is to solicit applications for eligible states to participate in a Cooperative Agreement to support the effective

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implementation of Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) approved designs to integrate care for Medicare-Medicaid enrollees. Funding under this announcement is only available to States that received a design contract for a Demonstration to Integrate Care for Dual Eligible Individuals and also have a signed Memorandum of Understanding with CMS to implement their demonstration design. SAMHSA FY 2013 Cooperative Agreements for Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) Grant

Deadline: *Apr. 29*

The purpose of this Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) program is to implement screening, brief intervention and referral to

treatment services for adults in primary care and community health settings, for substance misuse and substance use disorders. This program is designed to expand/enhance the state and tribal continuum of care for substance misuse services and reduce alcohol and drug consumption and its negative health impact; increase abstinence and reduce costly health care utilization; and promote sustainability of SBIRT services through the use of health information technology. The program is designed to expand/enhance the state/tribe's continuum of care to include universal, adult SBIRT services in primary care and community health settings and supports clinically appropriate services for persons at risk (asymptomatic) for, or diagnosed with, a substance use disorder. It also seeks to identify and sustain systems and policy changes to increase access to treatment in generalist and specialist settings, including greatly increasing the number of consumers accessing services through technological expansion. Medela Breastfeeding Hall of Excellence Grant

Deadline: *Apr. 30*

Breastfeeding Hall of Excellence, a program that recognizes individuals whose work supports breastfeeding, increases the initiation and duration of breastfeeding, and improves the health of women and infants. Grants of \$5,000 will be awarded to selected lactation consultants and breastfeeding advocates to fund research, sponsor continuing education, purchase equipment for use in practices (if applicable), or donate to the breastfeeding charity of their choice. HRSA State Systems Development Initiative Grant Program Grant

Deadline: *May 6*

The purpose of this grant is to assist state MCH and CSHCN programs in the building of State and community infrastructure that results in comprehensive, community-based systems of care for all children and their families. This funding opportunity announcement publicizes the availability of one-time supplemental funding for SSDI to support more timely provision of data from vital statistics and other data systems in order to facilitate State participation in a Collaborative Improvement and Innovation Network (CoIIN) to Reduce Infant Mortality. This funding will be used by participating States to develop, enhance, and/or support a data system that assures access to real-time data that will allow each State to measure its progress relative to the priority areas being addressed by each of the CoIIN strategy teams. The purpose of this grant is to identify, translate and pilot-test evidence-informed strategies and community best practices to improve linkage, retention and re-engagement of HIV positive persons in HIV care. This program proposes to identify “model programs” with evidence-informed or community-based strategies for improving linkage and retention in care, translate the “model programs” into Web- and other-technology-based tools and resources for implementation by other agencies, pilot test the tools with agencies experiencing challenges in linkage and retention of clients, and refinement of tools for potential dissemination by CDC to clinical and community-based providers. Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health Integrating Routine HIV Testing and Linkage to HIV Care and Treatment in Family Planning Services Grants

Deadline: *May 10*

This notice announces the anticipated availability of funds from the Secretary’s for Health Minority AIDS Initiative Fund (SMAIF) and Title X appropriations to support grants to provide high impact HIV prevention integrated with Title X family planning services. The goals of the OPA supported HIV prevention projects are to: 1) provide high impact HIV4prevention services, which include opt-out HIV testing, linkage of HIV positive clients to care and treatment, and for at-risk clients, behavioral interventions through counseling sessions, condom distribution, and STI screening and treatment; 2) increase effective linkage partnerships between Title X family planning sites and other community-based organizations that provide care and treatment services and; 3) provide training focused on the provision of high impact HIV prevention services in order to build staff capacity. State Offices of Rural Health Grant Program (SORH)

Deadline: *May 13*

the purpose of the State Offices of Rural Health (SORH) grant program is to assist States in strengthening rural health care delivery systems by maintaining a focal point for rural health within each State. The program provides funding for an institutional framework that links small rural communities with state and federal resources to help develop long term solutions to rural health problems. This competing continuation guidance provides instruction for applying for a new three year project period. Authorizing legislation provides that each SORH conduct the following activities: (1) Establish and maintain within the state a clearinghouse for collecting and disseminating information on rural health care issues, research findings relating to rural health care, and innovative approaches to the delivery of health care in rural areas; (2) Coordinate the activities carried out in the state that relate to rural health care, including providing coordination for the purpose of avoiding duplication in such activities; and (3) Identify federal, state, and nongovernmental programs regarding rural health, and provide technical assistance to public and nonprofit private entities regarding participation in such programs. CDC Improving state and local capacity to assess and manage risks associated with private wells and other small drinking-water systems by using the Environmental Health Specialist Network (EHS-Net)

Deadline: *May 15*

This announcement seeks applications from state and local health departments, and U.S. territories and Native American tribal public health agencies. Funding these initiatives will improve the recipients' ability to address critical gaps in understanding the possible exposures, hazards, and health outcomes in communities and populations using private wells (PW) or small drinking-water systems. Approximately 13 percent of U.S. households, or about 43 million people, use these types of water systems. CDC will fund as many as 15 awards to locate and use data to identify new, or clarify known or suspected, issues related to PW or small drinking-water systems that may affect public health. CDC Improving HIV Prevention and Treatment Outcomes Among HIV-Infected Persons by Integrating Community Pharmacists and Clinical Sites into a Model of Patient-Centered HIV Care

Deadline: *May 15*

CDC has entered into a public-private partnership with

Walgreen Company to develop and implement a model of HIV care that integrates community pharmacists with primary medical providers for patient-centered HIV care. The expected outcomes of the model program are increased retention in HIV care, adherence to HIV medication therapy and viral load suppression. Walgreens has agreed to provide expanded medication therapy management services to 1000 HIV-infected clients, currently or newly initiated on ART, at 10 project sites (~100 persons per site) throughout the country and to work with medical clinic providers to implement the service model. Grantees will work to complete the following activities: 1) develop a patient-centered HIV care model that incorporates Walgreens pharmacists with primary medical providers 2) implement the patient-centered HIV care model and 3) and monitor the performance of the patient-centered HIV care model and adjust the model as needed. Six recognized communities, with the goal of raising awareness and inspiring locally driven change across the country, will receive a \$25,000 cash prize and have their success stories shared broadly. Communities will be judged on their accomplishments as well as their capacity for and dedication to creating lasting change by harnessing the collective power of leaders, partners, and community members and for implementing a strategic approach that focuses on the factors that influence health, including health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and the physical environment. CDC Program to Support New Implementation of State or Territorial Public Health Laboratory Capacity for Newborn Bloodspot Screening of SCID Grant

Deadline: *May 28*

Newborn screening programs test infants for diseases that require immediate medical treatment but are not apparent at birth. More than 4 million newborns are tested annually in the United States, and thousands of infants and children are saved from disability and death through early detection and treatment. Newborn screening practices, including the types of disorders for which newborns are screened, vary from state to state. The purpose of this funding announcement is to increase the number of states and territories with active screening of severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID) newborn screening programs, and thereby strengthen identification and referral mechanisms to treat a greater number of affected newborns.
