In Case You Missed It – Home Visiting Funding Awarded

On Sept. 22, the Department of Housing and Human Services (HHS) awarded \$224 million to 49 states as part of the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program. Formula grant awards totaling \$124 million were awarded to 55 eligible agencies including 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands, the Northern Mariana Islands and America Samoa.

A total of \$100 million in competitive funding was awarded

to those states that have sufficiently demonstrated the interest and capacity to expand and/or enhance the development of their home visiting efforts. Specifically:

- Approximately \$66 million was awarded to nine states and jurisdictions that have already made progress toward implementing a high-quality home visiting program as part of a comprehensive, early childhood system
- Approximately \$34 million was awarded to 13 states and jurisdictions that currently have modest home visiting programs and want to build on existing efforts

Childhood Obesity Demonstration Project Receives Funding

On Sept. 29, HHS announced funding made available through the Affordable Care Act to support a four-year Childhood Obesity Demonstration Project. Supported by \$25 million in funding awards, the project will build on existing community efforts and will work to identify effective health care and community strategies to support children's healthy eating and active living, and help combat childhood obesity. The project will target children ages 2–12 years covered by the Children's Health Insurance Program. The project grantees include three research facilities, the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, San Diego State University and the Massachusetts State Department of Public Health. Each of these facilities will receive approximately \$6.2 million over four years to identify effective childhood obesity prevention strategies. The evaluation center located at the University of Houston will receive about \$4.2 million over four years to determine successful strategies and share lessons and successes. Community Transformation Grants Awarded

On Sept. 27, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) awarded \$103 million to 61 states and communities with over 120 million residents to fight chronic disease. All grantees will work to address the following priority areas: 1) tobacco-free living; 2) active living and healthy eating; and 3) quality clinical and other preventive services, specifically prevention and control of high blood pressure and high cholesterol. Grantees may also focus on creating healthy and safe environments and reducing health disparities.

Grantee activities include:

- Implementation – Thirty-five grantees will implement proven interventions to help improve health and wellness. Funding amounts range from \$500,000 to \$10 million depending on population size and scope of project.
- Capacity Building – Twenty-six grantees will work to build capacity by laying a solid foundation for sustainable community prevention efforts. Funding amounts range from \$147,000 to \$500,000 depending on population size and scope of project.

Open for Public Comment: Maternity Care Measure Set

The Physician Consortium for Performance Improvement (PCPI) initiated a 30-day public comment period for the Maternity Care measure set. The Maternity Care measures, developed in conjunction with the PCPI focus on measures of overuse and appropriate use, is a joint effort with PCPI, the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) and the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA). The draft measures are intended for clinicians caring for women who are pregnant. They are designed to improve processes that have been demonstrated to improve outcomes: ending preventable morbidity and mortality; reducing maternal infections;

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reducing unnecessary procedures that may cause harm or risk to mother and baby; and reducing depression, substance use and domestic violence during and after pregnancy. The measures are available for [review and for submission of comments](#). The public comment period will close 5 p.m. CST on Saturday, Oct. 29.

CDC Finds Insufficient Sleep for High School Students Associated with Health-Risk Behaviors

According to a study by the CDC, almost 70 percent of high school students are not getting the recommended hours of sleep on school nights. Insufficient sleep is associated with a variety of health-risk behaviors, including physical inactivity, drinking alcohol, smoking cigarettes, fighting and being sexually active. National Sleep Foundation Researchers found that 68.9 percent of adolescent responders to the 2007 national Youth Risk Behavior Survey reported insufficient sleep on an average school night. Students who reported insufficient sleep were more likely to engage in health-risk behavior than students who reported sufficient sleep. Read the full report, [here](#).

HRSA Funding for the Ryan White Part A HIV Emergency Relief Grant Program Modification 3

Deadline: Nov. 1

Part A of the *Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act* authorizes grants for primary medical care, access to antiretroviral therapies and other core services and support services to Eligible Metropolitan Areas (EMAs) and Transitional Grant Areas (TGAs). Part A funds may be used to provide a continuum of care for people living with HIV disease who are primarily low income, underserved, uninsured and underinsured. NIH Grant Funding for Causes and Consequences of Cystic Fibrosis Related Diabetes (R01)

This Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) invites applications for research project grants to study the causes and consequences of Cystic Fibrosis Related Diabetes (CFRD). CFRD is one of the most common complications of Cystic Fibrosis (CF) that occurs in almost half the patients with Cystic Fibrosis as they age. CF patients with CFRD have a higher morbidity and mortality than those who do not develop CFRD. It is not currently known why some patients develop CFRD although some genetic variants have been implicated. The mechanisms for the steeper decline in lung disease in patients with CFRD are also not understood. The NIDDK invites applications that study the etiology of CFRD in humans and animal models, as well as studies to understand the mechanisms for the increased morbidity in patients with CFRD.
