



OVERVIEW OF DEADLINES FOR FY 2010 MCH RELATED FEDERAL FUNDING

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) created three new MCH-related programs with funding available in FY 2010. Combined with the existing Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, Title X Family Planning, Adolescent Family Life program, existing CDC program in teen pregnancy prevention, the new Teenage Pregnancy Prevention program created last year, and restoration of the State Abstinence Education Grant Program, this means **approximately \$1.2 billion is available through nine MCH-related programs with deadlines prior to September 14, 2010**. These programs are administered by five different agencies of HHS as noted below.

Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant HRSA / MCHB \$552 million for states in FY 2010	The purpose of the Title V MCH Services Block Grant is to create Federal/State partnerships in all 50 States and 9 Jurisdictions to develop service systems to meet MCH challenges. Funds for Support for Pregnant and Parenting Teens and Women (Created by ACA) HHS Office of Adolescent Health \$24 million FY 2010	Purpose is to provide competitive grants for the development and implementation of programs to assist pregnant and parenting teens and women. Guidance available here .	August 2, 2010.
State Abstinence Education Grant Program ACF \$50 million FY 2010	Purpose is to support decisions to abstain from sexual activity until marriage by providing abstinence education as defined by Section 510(b)(2) of the Social Security Act with a focus on those groups that are most likely to bear children out-of-wedlock. Guidance was expected June 20. See HHS Grants Forecaster here for updates.	<i>Estimated due August 20, 2010.</i>
State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) (Created by ACA) ACF \$55 million FY 2010	Purpose is to educate youth between the ages of 10 and 19 on both abstinence and contraception for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, including HIV/AIDS. Guidance expected July 16, 2010. See HHS Grants Forecaster here .	<i>Estimated due September 14, 2010.</i>

<p>Teenage Pregnancy Prevention: Replication of Evidence-based Programs HHS Office of Adolescent Health \$110 million FY 2010</p>	<p>The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010 provides \$110 million for making competitive contracts and grants to public and private entities to fund medically accurate and age appropriate programs that reduce teenage pregnancy and for the Federal costs associated with administering and evaluating such contracts and grants. The statute states that of the funds made available (a) not less than \$75 million shall be for funding the replication of effective programs; and (b) not less than \$25 million shall be for funding for research and demonstration grants. <p>Adolescent Family Life HHS Office of Population Affairs \$4 million FY 2010</p>	<p>The AFL program supports demonstration projects to develop, implement and evaluate program interventions to promote the delay from sexual activity among adolescents and to provide comprehensive health care, education and social services to pregnant/parenting teens. Guidance available here.</p>	<p>Applications were due June 22, 2010.</p>
<p>Teenage Pregnancy Prevention: Integrating Services, Programs, and Strategies through Community-wide Initiatives CDC \$50 million FY 2010</p>	<p>The purpose is to demonstrate the effectiveness of innovative, multi-component, community-wide initiatives in preventing teen pregnancy and reducing rates of teen births in communities with the highest rates, with a focus on reaching African American and Latino youth aged 15-19. All adolescents shall be eligible to participate in program services without regard to race, ethnicity or sexual identity. Guidance available here.</p>	<p>Applications were due June 30, 2010.</p>
<p>Title X Family Planning HHS Office of Population Affairs \$283 million in FY 2010</p>	<p>Title X is the only federal grant program dedicated solely to providing individuals with comprehensive family planning and related preventive health services. The Title X program is designed to provide access to contraceptive services, supplies and information to all who want and need them. By law, priority is given to persons from low-income families. Guidance available here.</p>	<p>Deadlines vary by service region.</p>
