



Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant: Final Fiscal Year 2013 State-by-State Funding

This chart compares state Title V MCH Block Grant allocations from fiscal year 2012 to the final fiscal year 2013 post sequester level. Reductions to the block grant are due to sequestration, across the board cuts and other transfers that occurred after the continuing resolution was signed on Mar. 27, 2013. *NOTE: Due to the recent change in the data input to the formula some state cuts are greater than 5 percent whereas other states received a slight increase.*
