Transportation- helps people get where they need to go



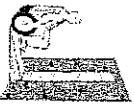
Vocational Services/ Supported Employment- assists people to work and have meaningful days

Emergency Assistance- responds to people in crisis



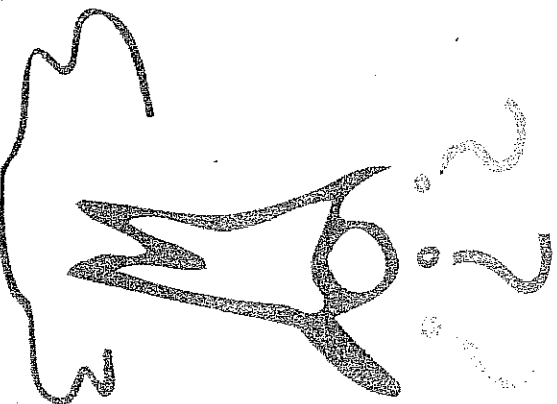
Environmental Adaptations and Home Modifications- helps make homes accessible to individual needs

To be eligible for supports funded through the Division of Developmental Disabilities individuals must meet the following definition of developmental disability, as stated in RI State Law:

“The term ‘developmental disability’ means a severe, chronic disability of a person which:

- is attributable to a mental or physical impairment or combination of mental and physical impairments;
- is manifested before the person attains age twenty-two (22);
- is likely to continue indefinitely;
- results in substantial functional limitations in three or more of the following areas of major life activity:

- personal care
- communication
- mobility
- learning
- self-direction
- capacity for independent living
- economic self-sufficiency, and,

reflects the person’s need for a combination and sequence of special, interdisciplinary, or generic care, treatment, or other services which are life-long or extended duration and are individually planned and coordinated.”

Not all disabilities which become manifest before age twenty-two are developmental disabilities. Mental illness is not the same as a developmental disability. Individuals with serious mental illness may receive services through the Department of MHRH, Division of Behavioral Healthcare Services.
